Dear Families

WOW! What a week... this week has been brilliantly busy and I am so thankful to our amazing staff who have worked tirelessly this week to make it so successful. Apologies now for the lengthy newsletter but we really want to share so many fantastic things with you!

Careers, Aspirations and Money Week

This week we launched our first ever, Careers and Aspirations Week. Part of our school mission is for children to leave us: Knowing their future choices and opportunities so we decided to build in a week where we really looked at jobs, careers and future choices. Did your child come home and talk about a job or career that they were interested in? A huge thank you to all the parents who came into school and volunteered their time to talk to the children about their careers.



The week started with Natasha from the University of Northampton coming into talk to KS2 about Your Future, Your Choice. They had an assembly all about opportunities and Year 6 took part in special workshops also led by UoN. There were then lots of other assemblies dotted about the week where the teachers spent time discussing with the children what they would like to do when they are older.

Nationwide visited us to deliver special lessons all about money and a HUGE thank you to everyone who gave up their time or visited to support our careers fair on Tuesday and Thursday! It was amazing to see the children learn so much from our community and I know many were inspired. Reception also loved their visit from the Fire Service, Police and DHL who taught them all about their jobs.

As part of this week Year 6 visited the University of Northampton and took part in their STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths) events. They loved learning about the different types of careers associated with these subjects and participating in hands-on activities.

We are hoping to run this event biannually and we have even more ideas for next time. A massive thank you to Miss Welch who organised this week.

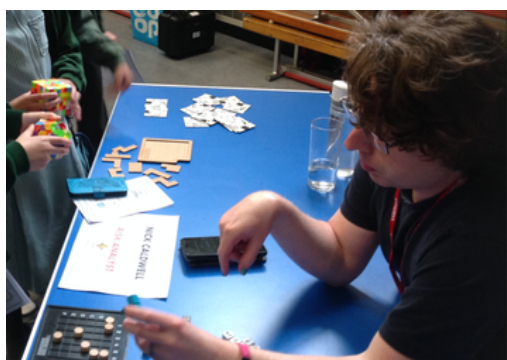

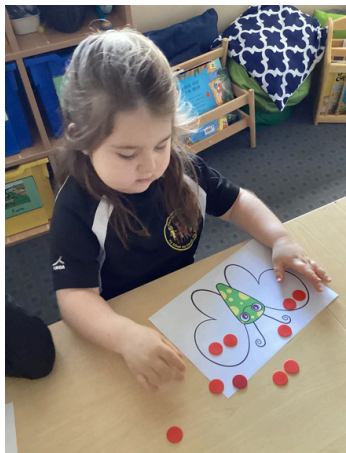
SU NEWS - GREEN CLASS

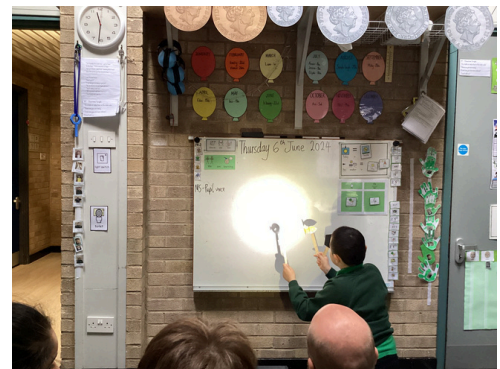


We were also very excited to make some shadow puppets and show them to the rest of the class!

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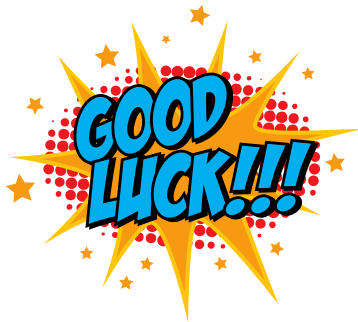
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Yr 4 trip to The National Gallery

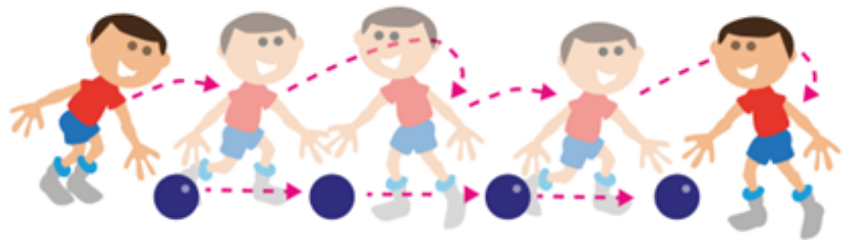

TUNNELS

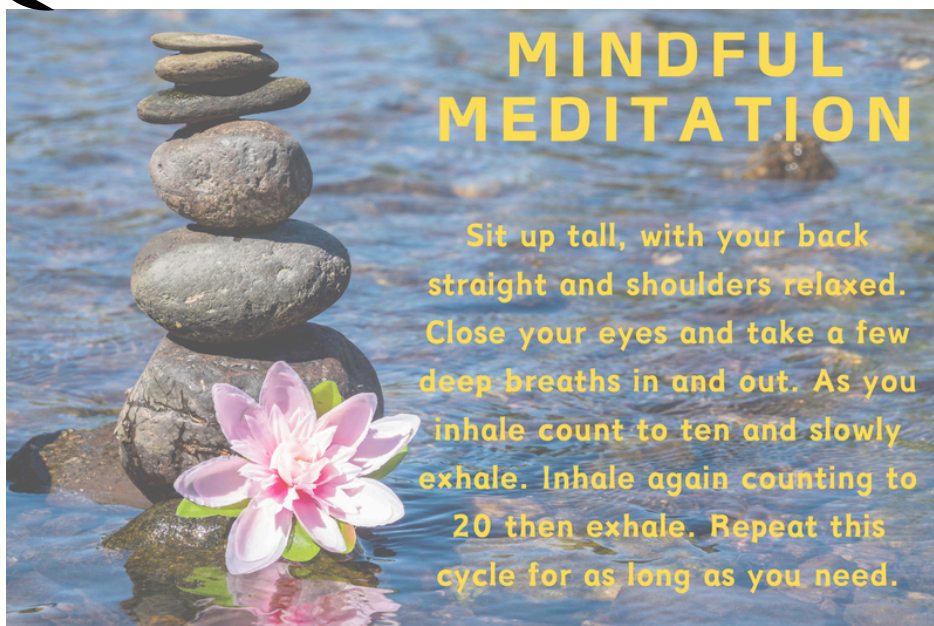
You will need:

- Cones
- A ball



Rules of the game:

- Individual – Mark out 10 metres, roll a ball, chase it, get in front of it and let it roll through your legs as many times as you can before it reaches the 10-metre marker. You must collect the ball before it goes past the marker to achieve a score.
- Pair – As above but let the ball roll through each player's legs in turn and count the cumulative number.



MINDFUL MEDITATION

Sit up tall, with your back straight and shoulders relaxed. Close your eyes and take a few deep breaths in and out. As you inhale count to ten and slowly exhale. Inhale again counting to 20 then exhale. Repeat this cycle for as long as you need.

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E-Safety



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about PALWORLD

In Palworld, players head out into an environment where they must craft items and survive alongside creatures called 'Pals'. In this sense, it's similar to Minecraft: light monsters while maintaining a base. Palworld has sold more than six million copies and often has over two million people playing online simultaneously.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

MATURE CONTENT (18 RATED)
While Palworld may look cute and cuddly, the game does have its more mature moments. For example, if you try to catch a Pal and don't succeed, the game will display a red 'X' over the Pal. There are also various references to inappropriate acts like slavery when getting your Pals to perform certain tasks for you. While the presentation is intended to be humorous, this content still be seen as being in poor taste.

VIOLENCE
Palworld has been referred to as "Pokémon with guns" and while good nature, the game does have some violence. Pals can be given firearms, explosives and other weapons, allowing them to fight by your player's side. There are several moments where cute animals use these guns to kill other Pals or fight against bosses. The violence is cartoonish and bloodless, but it's present.

SUGGESTIVE WRITING
Some of the Pal's descriptions - found in the game itself - can be very suggestive and adult in nature. The game mixes a lot of bonding on the line between age-appropriate and mature content. Playing on servers that have the two white mice being outgated people. While it's possible that younger players won't notice this content, it's just as unfortunate that they will.

ONLINE PLAY
Palworld can be played with other people online. On Xbox, players can only play with people on their Friends list. On PC, however, up to 22 players can share in the same game, playing in a large online world, and these players may not necessarily be known to the host beforehand. It can be quite complicated to set up these servers (online world) and they can cost money to keep active.

DIFFICULTY
Despite its endearing visuals, Palworld is actually an extremely challenging game in terms of surviving, crafting, and exploring. The environment can all be very tricky. It takes a lot of trial - or working together with friends - to be successful, which could be off-putting or even discouraging to young players expecting something more like Minecraft or Pokémon.

Advice for Parents & Educators

WATCH GAMEPLAY
Watching gameplay and reviews for Palworld on sites like YouTube is the best available means of gathering information on it, second only to playing it for yourself. Currently, there are plenty of videos showing this game off to the internet of large, often with detailed breakdowns of what can be found or done within it.

LEND A HAND
By learning the basics of the game - Pal catching, bottling, crafting items and building up a base - you can help to lower the difficulty for younger players. This, in turn, decreases the likelihood that each player will need to look online for tips and tricks, where they could quite easily stumble across more violent and mature content associated with the game.

SET CONTENT LIMITS
As Palworld is available on Xbox Game Pass, it's easy for players to access it. Any player subscribed to this service can simply find the title on Game Pass and hit the download button. If a child or young person isn't allowed to play Palworld, the best way to prevent them downloading it is regularly to enable high levels on their account, setting the limit below 12 will not allow users to install Palworld.

PLAY TOGETHER
By playing Palworld yourself, you'll have the best chance of catching any content that you don't think is second only to getting an idea of how violence is presented in the game. The content is cartoonish in nature - and players can help reduce the ability to use guns, at which point it can become more intense. It's best for you to give a look and form your own opinion.

PLACE BOUNDARIES
Limit options when it comes to online play. For players on PC, they'll still be able to cooperate with friends through the game's multiplayer option, much like Xbox users. Just because they have the option to run a dedicated server that's open to anyone doesn't mean they need to take it. The risk of interacting with strangers can be significantly lowered or even eliminated entirely by playing on servers which are restricted to friends only.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators FAIR PLAY AND FRIENDLY COMPETITION

In school sports, fair play and friendly competition are important for character development. Fair play embodies respect and integrity while good-natured competition balances rivalry with camaraderie. This guide addresses potential challenges - like the pressure to win - and offers practical tips on instilling values of fair play and cultivating a positive sporting environment for young athletes.

- 1 LEAD BY EXAMPLE**
Parents, carers and teachers should try to exemplify fair play, demonstrating respect for opponents, respect for rules, and respect for officials. Encouraging a sense of fair play is a positive precedent for children to follow in their own actions on and off the field.
- 2 EFFORT OVER OUTCOME**
Encourage children to focus on giving their all, rather than being their entire performance on whether they win or not. This fosters a growth mindset, where improvement is valued just as much as the final result. It also teaches children that success can be achieved through hard work and perseverance, which can be a valuable lesson in many areas of life.
- 3 SET CLEAR EXPECTATIONS**
Establish clear guidelines and expectations for behaviour before, during and after sporting events. Ensuring that children understand what is expected of them can help prevent misunderstandings and promote a positive, respectful environment.
- 4 HIGHLIGHT COOPERATION**
Underline the value of teamwork and cooperation in sporting success. Focus on just about individual achievements, but about how the team came together to support each other and work together towards a common goal. Encouraging children to support their teammates and mutual respect is a key part of building a positive sporting environment.
- 5 DISCUSS ACCEPTING DEFEAT**
Help children to understand that they can't win every match - that losing is an important part of both sport and life in general. Teaching them to accept defeat gracefully and learn from their mistakes promotes resilience, humility and the ability to bounce back stronger from setbacks. Taking a loss in sport is a chance to learn from mistakes and can help build an understanding of how to improve in their future life.
- 6 ENCOURAGE INCLUSIVE PARTICIPATION**
Promote an environment where all children feel welcome and valued, regardless of their skill level. Promote the importance of participation and enjoyment over winning, creating a supportive atmosphere where every child can thrive and develop their abilities without unnecessary pressure.
- 7 FOSTER CONFLICT RESOLUTION SKILLS**
Teach children how to resolve conflicts peacefully and respectfully, both on and off the field. Promoting team with strategies for effective communication and problem-solving helps build stronger relationships and empowers them to resolve any challenges that arise in a huge team to them throughout their adult lives.
- 8 TEACH RESPECT**
Emphasise to children the importance of respecting everyone involved in the game, regardless of their position. Respect for your teammates, opponents, coaches and officials helps to create a positive, inclusive sports environment where everyone can feel valued and appreciated.
- 9 GIVE CONSTRUCTIVE FEEDBACK**
Offer feedback that focuses on areas for improvement rather than criticism. Praise what a child has done well and advice on how to improve, rather than being overly critical. Encouraging a growth mindset and highlighting progress helps children to accept challenges, setbacks and a desire to continue striving for success.
- 10 CELEBRATE GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP**
Try to avoid overly focusing attention on children's physical performance on the field. Recognise and celebrate acts of sportsmanship, fair play and kindness. By spotlighting positive behaviour, you reinforce the values of good sportsmanship and encourage children to practice this in the future, creating a culture of respect and mutual support. The sports community that does wonders for everyone.
