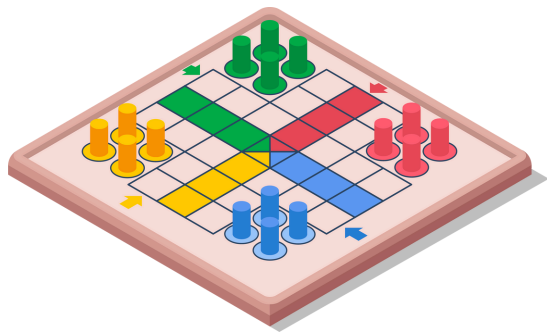
Year 4 Rainforest Experience

On Wednesday, our Year 4 children and Orange Class had a very special visitor in to launch their Geography and reading learning all about Rainforests. Simon, who has spent over 25 years exploring jungles, shared amazing images and videos from his expeditions and talked to us about the flora and fauna we might see. From tiny fungi to the giant kapok tree, creepy crawlies to high dwelling monkeys there was lots to enjoy and learn. In the afternoon we considered the damage being done to the rainforest and how it can be fixed. There was also an essential guide on how to survive on an expedition (with some gory photos of what happens when you forget the rules)! By the end of the day, we all felt like experts on the rainforest, we had really learnt so much. It was an amazing opportunity for the children to secure their foundations for future learning in this area.

SU NEWS - GREEN CLASS

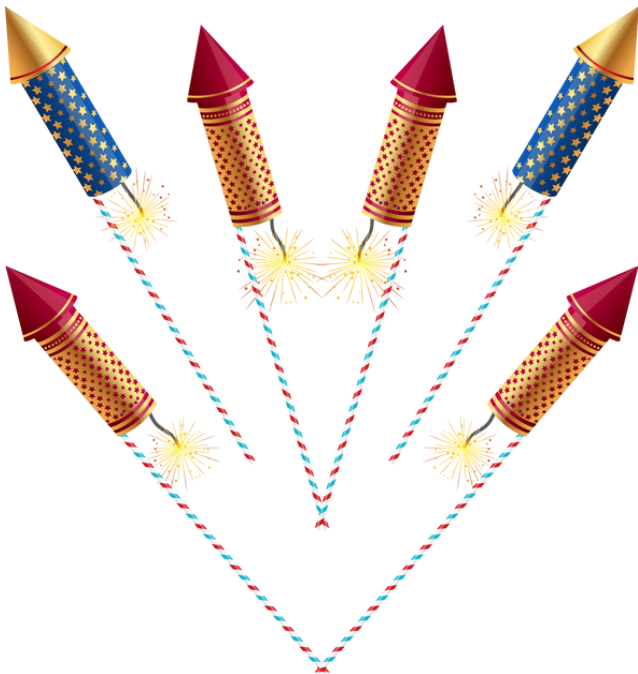
Green Class have been learning lots since you last heard from us!

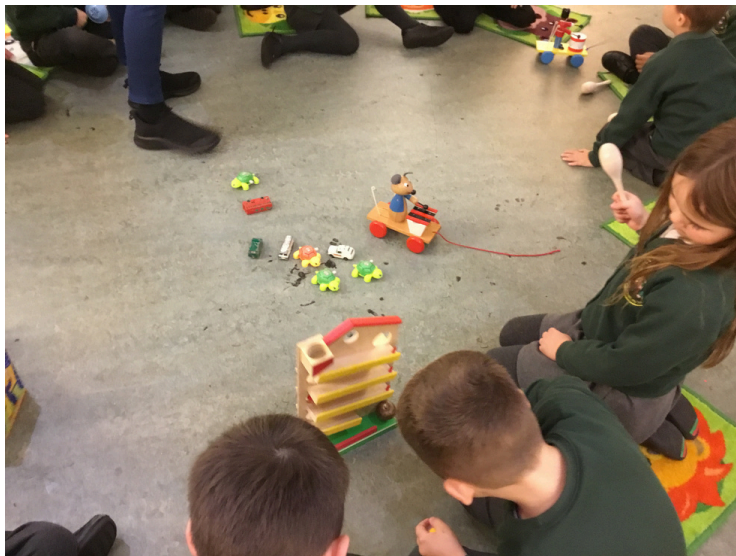

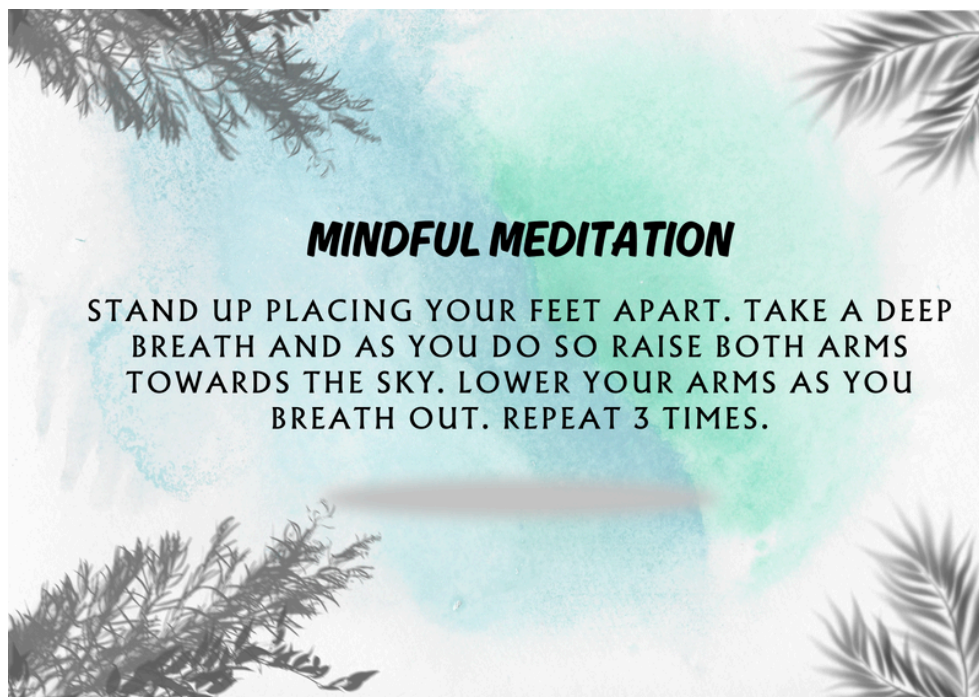

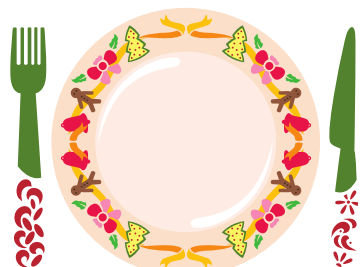
Who works at East Hunsbury Primary School?

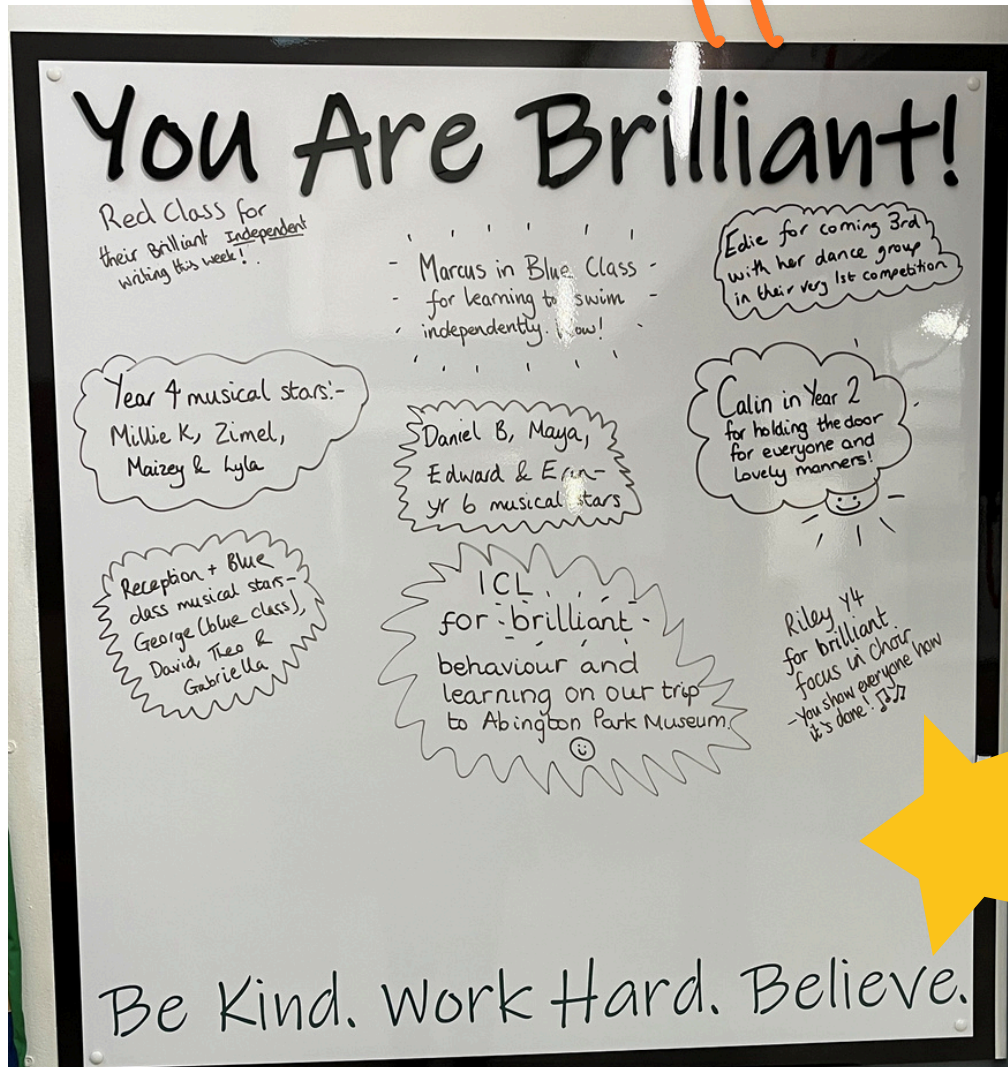

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about FORTNITE

Fortnite was launched back in 2017, but it remains massively popular – with more than 650 million active players. That's partially due to the competitive nature of its player-vs-player combat, its pop culture crossovers and its constantly shifting map. Significant updates are rolled out with each new version of the game – known as 'chapters' – and within these sit shorter 'seasons'.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

ALWAYS ONLINE
There's no single-player offline mode in Fortnite. It can only be played online. Internet access can sometimes be an issue when you're out and about (both in terms of connectivity and using up data). As you may find that dedicated young Fortnite players are often less enthusiastic about their own – such as during school holidays – than you might expect.

IN-GAME COSTS
Fortnite is free to download and play, but it does offer various additional purchases – cosmetics, skins, music tracks and LEGO items – which don't really impact on gameplay but can cost a significant amount. These items are bought with in-game currency, V-Bucks – earned through completing the Battle Pass (which also costs V-Bucks) and can also be purchased from the in-game store for real money.

POP CULTURE REFERENCES
Part of Fortnite's appeal is its ongoing crossovers with other popular franchises, ranging from movies and TV shows like Family Guy and Avatar: The Last Airbender to comic book characters including Batman. It's also got games such as Street Fighter. This means you could have children asking questions about the crossover from Adam or Groot from The Guardians of the Galaxy to whether a little soccer team you otherwise might have.

CROSSPLAY AND PARTY CHAT
Fortnite is popular with many gamers of various ages. 'Crossplay' lets friends play with each other, regardless of whether they're on an Xbox, PlayStation, Nintendo Switch or PC – while the party chat feature allows them to talk to each other during the game. This can, however, put youngsters at risk of hearing inappropriate language from older players in the heat of virtual combat.

VIRTUAL VIOLENCE
At its core, there's no denying that Fortnite is about shooting other players to eliminate them from the game. That said, there's no blood or gore. The violence is rendered in a cartoonish style, and there are frequent cartoonish touches to lighten the mood, such as fishing mini-games and dancing emotes. However, guns, weapons and other weapons often look and behave realistically, however, so discretion is advised.

FREQUENT UPDATES
The game's developers release content in 'seasons' that usually run for around ten weeks. Each season update sees items added to the in-game store, changes to the environment's landscape and different 'winning' themes (such as 'medieval', 'zombie' or 'party'). These regular releases help to hold players' interest – but also give young gamers plenty of reasons to keep coming back.

Advice for Parents & Educators

MATCH GAMING TIMES
Younger players tend to play Fortnite with their friends, which is fine. It could be worth speaking to the parents and carers of a child's wider group and coordinating their gaming around certain times of day. Safety in numbers is obviously a factor here, but it will also help children feel that they're getting adequate opportunities to socialise with their friends online.

SET SPENDING LIMITS
Fortnite's rotating store is a not-so-subtle mechanism for coaxing players into buying new items before they disappear for weeks or months. It could lead to impulsive purchases, so it's best if children are taught to think twice before buying. Parents could consider getting a prepaid card for the child or ensuring that purchases require adult authorisation. This can be done through parental settings on a console or account settings in the Epic Games app on PC.

USE UPDATES AS REWARDS
Fortnite's seasonal updates are free, but each also brings the option of a 'battle pass' – containing exclusive rewards for playing the game and completing set challenges. The pass could demand EA and on occasion be an effective reward for young Fortnite fans for good behaviour or academic performance, or as an incentive for completing chores like tidying their room.

BE WARY OF SCAMS
The immense popularity of Fortnite with younger audiences – that are generally more trusting – means it's no surprise of accounts posing as Fortnite players and other popular characters like phishing. As the developers point out on many of Fortnite's loading screens, they never ask for a player's account password outside of the game. Make sure any young player knows this.

ENJOY FORTNITE TOGETHER
Fortnite also offers split-screen gameplay, meaning that two people can play simultaneously on the same console or computer. This can be a good option for siblings or for when a child's friends visit, but it also offers an opportunity for parents and carers to do something fun with their child, while also making sure they're playing the game safely. Who knows? You might even teach them a thing or two!

WhatsApp

Users should be at least 13 years old to use WhatsApp.

We frequently receive reports of children not using WhatsApp appropriately, such as sharing images to embarrass others, sending hurtful messages, spreading rumours, or excluding people from group chats to make them feel left out.

Since WhatsApp lacks parental controls, it is important to think about whether it is really the right platform for your child. For example, you should consider if your child has the critical thinking skills to recognise bullying. Furthermore, do they understand how to manage peer pressure and refrain from joining in on harmful behaviour?

If your child is using WhatsApp, it is crucial to have regular conversations with them. Talk about who they are chatting with, encourage them to think carefully about the messages they send and how they might be perceived by others. Finally, make sure to model good digital behaviour yourself, as children often learn by observing the adults around them.

What should I be aware of if my child is using WhatsApp?

- Group chats:** Everyone within a group, even if they are not one of your child's contacts, will be able to see all messages within that group. If your child is added to a group with someone that they have previously blocked, that person can still see their messages and send them messages within the group chat. If your child is using WhatsApp, check their group privacy settings to see who can add them to groups. Ensure your child understands that they can leave a chat at any time, and they know how to report users. Find out more here: <https://faq.whatsapp.com/424124171736394>

- Inappropriate content:** users can be exposed to content that is not suitable for their age.
- Location sharing:** talk to your child about when this would be appropriate to use and the potential danger of sharing their location.
- Chat lock/secret code:** users can lock chats as well as apply a secret code setting so a chat does not appear in the main chat.
- Blocking/Reporting:** Show your child how to block and report other users. Find out how here: <https://faq.whatsapp.com/1142481766359885/>

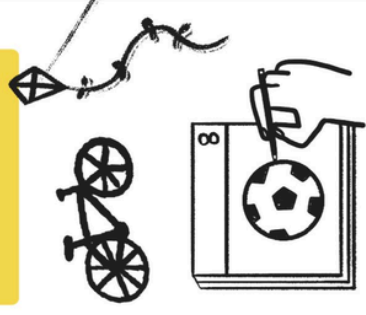
