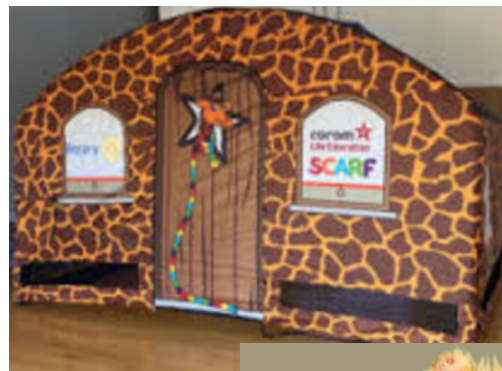
Fun fact – His parents were primary school teachers!

In exchange for these items, your child can come to school in mufti clothes on Friday 29th November.

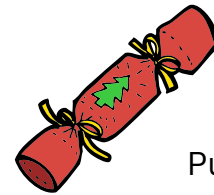

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about TIKTOK

AGE RESTRICTION 13+
(Certain features are restricted to over-18s only)

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

TIKTOK is a free-to-use social media platform that lets people watch and share short videos of up to ten minutes in length. Its music, trends, and celebrity cameos have made it enormously popular with an estimated 1 billion users worldwide – but its algorithm that surfaces videos based on users' activity can make the app seriously addictive.

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT
While TikTok's "following" feed only displays videos from users that someone follows, the "For You" feed will primarily be highly targeted and engaging, but it could potentially show something unsuitable. What's worse, if they engage with this content, more will follow. TikTok's guidelines prohibit the sharing of illegal or inappropriate content, but the volume of uploads means that they aren't routinely monitored.

DANGEROUS CHALLENGES
Due to TikTok's immense popularity, some young people have unfortunately been influenced by videos challenging them to perform harmful, criminal, or even deadly acts. One example is the "blackout" trend, which encouraged users to hold their breath until they passed out due to lack of oxygen. It led to two families filing lawsuits against TikTok over the tragic deaths of their children.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS
With over 1.5 billion users globally, the potential for contact from strangers on TikTok is high – especially as accounts have state of birth are set to public by default. This not only means that someone's profile is visible to everyone else on the app, it also suggests their child can send messages – and if they can, strangers can't either send anyone to download or comment on them.

IN-APP SPENDING
TIKTOK is free, but users have the option to buy TikTok coins, which can be used to purchase emojis in the app. These emojis are then sent to rewards for other users for videos they've created, raising their monetary value. Coin bundles range from £3.66 to an eye-watering £99. TikTok's policy is that they can't be bought by under-18s, but it's possible to bypass this with a fake birthday.

ADDICTIVE NATURE
Like all social networking platforms, TikTok can be addictive. Recent figures show that young people are investing increasing amounts of time on it. In 2024, UK children have spent an average of 127 minutes per day on TikTok – twice as much as in 2022 – according to parental controls company Qustodio. This compulsive usage can interfere with children's sleep patterns – leading to irritability – and distract them from other, healthier activities.

MISINFORMATION AND RADICALISATION
Although the short-form videos on TikTok tend to be more lighthearted than the longer ones on YouTube, clips can still influence impressionable minds in a negative way. Not only is there plenty of dangerous misinformation on TikTok, but with TikTok reporting that nearly a third of children aged 12-18 use TikTok as a news source, you should be wary of extremist material.

Advice for Parents & Educators

ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING
Family pairing allows parents to link their TikTok account to their child's and control their settings remotely. Parents can then turn on restricted mode (reducing the chances of a child seeing inappropriate content), set screen time limits, and manage whether their child can send messages – and if they can, children can't alter these settings without parental approval.

MAKE ACCOUNTS PRIVATE
Although under-18s will have their TikTok account set to private by default, suppressing this setting is relatively easy. However, parents have the ability to manually set their child's account to private – meaning that their videos won't be visible to strangers, and they won't be able to exchange messages with people who aren't on their friends list.

LIMIT IN-APP SPENDING
If a child is using an iPhone or Android device to access TikTok, you can alter their settings to prevent them from making in-app purchases. We'd recommend that you enable this feature, as it will prevent a young person from spending a significant amount of real money buying TikTok coins to unlock more features of the app – sometimes without even realising.

DISCUSS THE DANGERS
If a child wants to use TikTok and you're happy for them to do so, it's crucial to talk about the potential risks in this type of app. For example, ensure that they understand not to share any identifying personal information, and to talk to a trusted adult if they're in a position to inappropriate content. Thinking critically about what they see on TikTok can help children become more social media savvy.

READ THE SIGNS
If you're concerned that a child is spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the possible signs. Increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags, as is failing to complete homework, or skipping meals.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators EDUCATING CHILDREN ON SPENDING AND SAVING

Evidence shows that children's spending habits begin to form as early as seven years old. With primary schools in England not required to teach financial literacy, many young people are reaching adulthood without knowing the basics of budgeting. This guide explains how to teach young people about money in a practical way, giving them the understanding to become savvy spenders and savers.

- 1 PROVIDE POCKET MONEY**
Giving children money – even a small amount – can help them learn to make budgeting decisions about how to spend or save it. Research shows that young people who receive pocket money are more likely to become adults with strong financial skills and significantly less debt.
- 2 USE A PREPAID CARD**
Being able to pay by card is essential these days, with some retailers not accepting cash. Cards that parents, prepaid debit cards are available for children from the age of six, allowing them to get used to spending. But they will be adults with no risk of slipping into an overdraft. It's essential that children are aware of a gain – you need to get in the pool and have a swim.
- 3 PRACTISE BORROWING**
Although official borrowing is only available to over-18s, kids need to understand how debt and interest works before they become adults and are expected to pay bills or take out a loan. Parents can practise this by giving their child a small amount of money but explain that it needs to be paid back by a certain date, plus an extra couple of pounds as interest.
- 4 ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATION**
Chatting about money and how much things cost will teach children that finance is a part of everyday life and not some "boring adult thing". Parents can involve them in budgeting for the weekly shop, for example, working together to get everything on the list while keeping the total below a certain amount. Encouraging them to make spending decisions in a safe space can build up their confidence regarding money.
- 5 DISCUSS THE PRESSURE TO SPEND**
Whether it's YouTube ads or a friend of a friend's recent purchase, marketing triggers are everywhere. Encourage children to notice how these things change their feelings about the (shop) and other such as 2 for 1 deals which are often aimed at children. Encourage them to be smart shoppers by getting them to wait on it before deciding to spend.
- 6 TELLING 'NEED' FROM 'WANT'**
Learning how to prioritise spending is an important life skill. The difference between a 'need' and a 'want' is 'need to have' vs 'nice to have'. It's key to budgeting. If a child's parent has to budget while shopping, it's the perfect time to say "That's a want, we're getting our money for what you could show how you budget for food, electricity and so on before buying fun things."
- 7 ENCOURAGE SAVING**
Getting children saving every coin sets them up with a useful habit for their adult life. Suggest that they set something aside every time they receive money and help them set a target for how much to put away, so they feel motivated to continue. For example, encouraging them to save for a friend's birthday gift can get children much more invested in what they buy.
- 8 SPARK INTEREST IN INVESTING**
Motivate children by telling them about interest. You can describe it as a reward for saving money. Explain how everything they put away earns them more money. Encourage them to save up for something they want to buy. Encourage them to save up for a friend's birthday gift can get children much more invested in what they buy.
- 9 PAVING FOR CHORES**
This is a complex debate with no right or wrong answer! It depends on what works for each individual family. However, it can be one of the best ways to teach children that money needs to be earned and helps to create more meaningful spenders. If parents aren't keen on paying for chores, encourage them to suggest their own ideas for earning a little extra.
- 10 PROTECT CHILDREN FROM SCAMS**
Scams are a frustrating way to lose money, and children are generally more likely to be taken in by them. Encourage them to be smart with their financial choices. As a minimum, make sure they're aware of the most common ways that scammers could be exposed to – by text, email and phone. Encourage them to be smart about their online activity and never give out their personal information.
