Fundraising!



Our FEHPS BINGO event raised a staggering £680 - thank you to all of our families for supporting these important events – every penny donated will support your child's education in some way.



Get your wellies and gardening gloves ready for East Hunsbury's two day Planting Fest!

We are excited to share the details of a special half-term event that is taking place on 20th & 21st February.

The East Hunsbury Planting Festival is an opportunity for the community to come along and join in planting trees, bulbs and seeds in two open green spaces: Penvale Park and Blacky More Park.

The RAIN Project and Woodland Dwellings team will provide direction on what is being planted and where, with tools available - though feel free to bring your own.

Day One: Thursday 20th February

- 10:00 Penvale Park – Butterfly bund seeding
- 11:00 Penvale Park – Naturalised bulb planting
- 12:00 – Community orchard maintenance
- 13:00 Library – Create a RAIN garden

Day Two: Friday 21st February

- 10:00 Blacky More Park – Cherry tree planting
- 10:00 Blacky More Park – Daffodil planting
- 12:00 Blacky More Park – FREE pizza for helpers on Friday

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about ONLINE RELATIONSHIPS & DATING APPS

Dating apps are used to help people find new relationships – whether casual or more long term – matching users based on age, interests, gender and more. Some may consider dating apps harmless to under-18s because they aren't able to use them, but effective age verification measures are quite scarce, and it's been known for young people to end up on apps of this type.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

EASE OF ACCESS

The relatively lax age verification process of many dating apps means that incredibly accessible for children who have discovered how to use them. This carries the obvious risk of exposing children to a dating app populated by adults – who may not even be aware of the young person's true age. This is concerning when we consider the "hook-up culture" common on these apps – with many people using them to arrange sexual contact.

CONTACT AND CONDUCT RISKS

Once someone is active on a dating app, their online profile picture often shows to the app and might be accessed by others. This can lead to random users "sliding into their DM's" (sending direct messages) without consent. Computer criminals could start bombarding a young person's inbox with pictures, messages and social comments.

SCAMS AND SEXUAL EXPLOITATION

Some young people may feel they've formed a real bond with someone through online dating, and there's always a risk that it's not genuine. Scammers on these apps often build romantic connections with their victims – then once they feel they have their victim's trust, they begin asking for money under false pretences (such as helping them travel to a new location and requesting a "loan" to cover a train ticket).

UNVERIFIED ACCOUNTS

As with all online interactions, you may not be talking to whom you think you are. Without putting in a real name, users of dating apps can often only show a certain number of photos or a bio. It's not hard for someone using people to set their age limit to 18 years and end – putting them in a space and more however – consent to bypass the usual restrictions. Unfortunately, this can lead to interactions with someone much older.

PEER PRESSURE

The pressure to be in a relationship can be huge, and many young people use online dating apps to find it difficult to meet people organically due to their timidity, and may not have the time or money to go out and socialise. It's also common for young people to set up accounts for their single friends in the hope of finding a match for someone they know.

SKewed PERSPECTIVES

Dating apps can provide an unrealistic view of what makes someone attractive. With such vast options, some users can become both picky and extremely harsh about others' profiles. A person's profile picture and bio may be all that's seen, and the young person might be judged on the basis of being judged. Even when someone does start dating, there's a potential for someone to feel that their partner is only one swipe away from a potentially better match.

Advice for Parents & Educators

TALK ABOUT DATING APPS

Let young people know that they can talk to you about anything, even something as private as their dating life. At school, the relationships, sex and health curriculum can cover conversations around healthy relationships, consent and online safety. Emphasise the message that you want to help them make healthy, safe and informed choices. If they feel embarrassed talking to you, make sure they have a trusted adult who can help them.

VERIFICATION STAMPS

Explain that someone using a dating app should only communicate with those who have gone through a verification process. Online dating apps use a variety of methods to verify a user's identity, including scanning official documents (such as a driver's licence or passport). Verification can also involve users taking a selfie to ensure that the photos on their profile match it.

ENCOURAGE DATA PROTECTION

Empower young people to protect their data and personal information. Explain why including things like their school, age and surname in their profile could potentially be dangerous. Make sure they know how to give and personal details, and that there's no reason for other users to ask for them. If they feel uneasy about a situation online, they need to speak to someone that they can trust.

REPORT AND BLOCK

Remind young people that they can always report or block (or ban) anyone who makes them feel uncomfortable on any platform. Ask if they know how to do this and offer to help them figure it out if they're unsure. Every app should have advice on how to report or block another user, so be sure young people are familiar with the settings.
